THE Maharashtra Pollution Control Board has constituted a committee to study the effects of pollution from the chemical industry on human being and other living organisms, following the Union minister of state for environment Mrs Maneka Gandhi's visit to Bombay.

The committee is headed by Dr S. R. Kamat, a lung specialist and consultant on pollution hazards. Dr A. A. Mahashur, head of the department of chest medicine at K.E.M. Hospital, Dr U. C. Mishra, head of the BARC air monitoring section and Mr T. R. Saranathan of the Society for Clean Cities, are other members of the committee.

Mr C. D. Oomachen, chairman of the pollution control board, said today that he had constituted the committee because people residing in
